
It's awesome when all of the people live together in unity:


when waters are rough, we hold each other tightly. When the sea begins to swallow us up, we hold each other tightly and call on God.

Hebrew Scripture Reading

2 Samuel 1:1, 17-27

After Saul's death, David returned from his victory over the Amalekites and spent two days at Ziklag. David took up his lament for Saul and Jonathan and ordered that "*The Song of the Bow*" be taught to the Judeans. It is written in the *Book of Jashar*:

Saul, your glory, Israel, lies slain,

How the mighty have fallen!

Do not announce it in Gath,

do not proclaim it in the streets of Ashkelon, lest the daughters of the Philistines rejoice, lest the daughters of the heathen exalt.

Heights of Gilboa:

may neither dew nor rain refresh you, nor deep springs make your fields lush. For there the tarnished shields of warriors lie. Saul's shield glimmers no more.

From the blood of the dead.

from the flesh of the fallen, Jonathan's bow did not fail, nor did Saul's sword return unstained.

Mark 5:21-43

When Jesus had crossed again to the other shore in the boat, a large crowd gathered, and he stayed by the lakeside. Then one of the Synagogue officials—Jairus by name— came up and, seeing Jesus, fell down and pleaded earnestly, saying, "My little daughter is desperately sick. Come and lay your hands on her to make her better and save her life." Jesus went with him, and a large crowd followed, pressing from all sides.

Now there was a woman who had suffered from hemorrhages for twelve years; after long and painful treatment from various doctors, she had spent all she had without getting better—in fact, she was getting worse. She had heard about Jesus, and she came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak. "If I can touch even the hem," she told herself, "I will be well again." Immediately the flow of blood dried up, and she felt in her body that she was healed of her affliction.

Immediately aware that the healing power had gone out from him, Jesus turned to the crowd and said, "Who touched me?"

The disciples said, "You see how the crowd is pressing you and yet you say, "Who touched me?"

But Jesus continued to look around to see who had done it. Then the woman came forward, frightened and trembling because she knew what had happened to her, and she fell at Jesus' feet and told him the truth.

"My daughter," Jesus said, "your faith has saved you; go in peace and be free of your affliction."

While Jesus was speaking, some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why put the Teacher to any further trouble?"

But Jesus overheard the remark and said to the official: "Don't be afraid. Just believe." Jesus allowed no one to follow him except Peter and James and James' brother John.

They came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. Jesus went in and said to them, "Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep." At this, they began to ridicule him, and he told everyone to leave.

Jesus took the child's mother and father and his own companions and entered the room where the child lay. Taking her hand, he said to her, "Talitha, koum!" which means, "Little girl, get up!" Immediately the girl, who was twelve years old, got up and began to walk about.

At this they were overcome with astonishment. Jesus gave the family strict orders not to let anyone know about it and told them to give the little girl something to eat. (Inclusive Bible Version)

Here ends the reading of the Gospel. This is the Good News of Jesus Christ.







Bloom in the Desert Ministries (Bloom) is a United Church of Christ (UCC) that had Methodist

beginnings. This liberal Protestant church was born in 2002, as an independent ministry in collaboration with Methodist organizations seeking to start and promote inclusive Christian ministries. Sunday worship began on March 9, 2003. The fledgling congregation decided in 2004 to pursue standing in the UCC, which was established by vote of the Eastern Association of the Southern California Nevada Conference of the UCC on October 29, 2005, welcoming Bloom as a dual covenant, peace, and justice congregation. Bloom is a member of the UCC Open and Affirming Coalition and the Reconciling Ministries Network (Methodist). Bloom is governed congregationally according to our unique bylaws. All Bloom members and friends are ministers in our faith. Our Open Leadership Team and congregation meetings provide leadership and decision making to empower our vision, mission, and core values.
